I am a photographer.

I believe that creative work should be available to people and not kept solely in museums and galleries.

I use a small, fast, automatic camera and print on a microfilm reader-printer that I have modified. The machine can process a print in 20 seconds. The combination of the speed of the camera and the ease with which the machine produces a print encourages me to photograph whatever and whenever I feel like it. I feel the best about photographing when it is as natural as talking.

There are 40 traveling gallery buses in the Boston-Cambridge area, and each bus has a different set of my pictures. What I've learned making these pictures is how much I rely on other people. Without other people fantasies remain fantasies. I want to thank the Institute of Contemporary Art for a grant which made this show a possibility. I want to thank Eugene Kenney, Tony Sanchez, Lea Viele, Jane Dillenberg, Janet Borden, Laurie Yarlow and Elaine Mayes for making it a reality.

The Bus Show

There will be an exhibition of photographs in 500 New York City public buses in May of 1975.
The purpose of the show is to present excellent photographs in a public space. All prints will appear with the photographer is ame and the picture is title.
Photographs accepted for the exhibition will become part of the permanent collection of the Library of Congress. Send duplicate prints of each photography out wish to submit; one print will go on a bus, the other to the Library of Congress. You must state what rights you graft to the Library of Congress with each pixture production, or neither without your specific approval. Gyraphs to be considered for one person shows or as part of the group exhibit. Since the photographs will be placed in the interior advertising space of the buses there are certain size requirements, and in the case of one person shows, a specific number of photographs are needed to filt he available spaces. I you are submitting for group exhibition, send us any number of photographs in any of the size categories. For one person

shows, you must submit the exact number of photographs needed to fill a bus, in each of the size categories. The size requirements and number of photographs for each bus is as follows: 14 photographs with an image height of 9 inches; one horizontal photograph with an image height of 9 inches; one horizontal photograph with an image height of 18 inches; hotographs not accepted for one person shows will automatically be juried as part of the group exhibition.

All work must be unmounted and untrimmed. Remember to submit duplicate prints of each photograph. Work not accepted will be returned if postage is included. On the back of each print write your name, the picture's title, and the rights you grant to the Library of Congress. Enclose a 3'x5' file card with your name, address, and phone number.
